PEGI rating system

PEGI (Pan European Game Information) is a system of age-rating and labelling games, which includes descriptors to indicate the main reasons why a game has received a particular age rating:

Fortnite is an online shooter that starts with 100 players and leaves **one winner standing**. **Battle Royale** sees 100 players parachute onto an island, and the last player alive wins. Each game lasts about **20 minutes**


It has a PEGI rating of 12, for 'frequent scenes of mild violence'




National Crime Agency...

Although the game itself seems pretty harmless, **players can talk and type whatever they want** to each other, and bad language is rampant



- Set up time limits on how long they spend playing...



Children hooked on addictive video games like Fortnite will be able to seek treatment on the NHS, after video gaming is classified as a medical disorder by the World Health Organisation (WHO).

Spotting the signs...

- Being **secretive** about their online activities **spending more or less time** than usual online
- Being **upset after using** their phone or laptop
- Difficulty **sleeping**
- Lacking **confidence or self-esteem**
- Avoiding **social situations**
- Not wanting to go to school
- Becoming increasingly **withdrawn, upset or angry**

What should I do if my child is being bullied online?

- Stay calm
- Listen without judging
- Praise them for talking to you
- Tell them you can help
- Ask them not to reply
- Block the bullies
- Keep the evidence
- Report information to your child's school.

SEXTING

When people talk about sexting, they usually mean **sending & receiving...**

- Naked pictures or 'nudes'...
- '...underwear shots'...
- ...sexual or 'dirty pics'...
- ...rude text messages or videos.

Why do children send inappropriate images / videos?

There are many reasons why a young person may want to send a naked/semi-naked picture, video or message to someone else...

- A** joining in because they think that 'everyone is doing it'
- B** boosting their self-esteem
- C** flirting with others and testing their sexual identity exploring their sexual feelings
- D** to get attention and connect with new people on social media
- E** they may find it difficult to say 'no' if somebody asks them for an explicit image, especially if the person asking is persistent

Blackmail, bullying and harm

- Blackmail**: An offender may threaten to share the pictures with the child's family and friends unless the child sends money or more images.
- Bullying**: If images are shared with their peers at school, the child may be bullied.
- Sexting**: Sexting can leave young people vulnerable to...
- Emotional distress**: Children can feel embarrassed and humiliated. If they're very distressed this could lead to suicide or self-harm.
- Unwanted attention**: Images posted online can attract the attention of sex offenders, who know how to search for, collect & misuse images.

THE LAW....

Protection of Children Act 1978
Makes it an offence to take, make, show, distribute, possess (with a view to distribute) or publish an advertisement with an indecent photograph or pseudo-photograph of a child under the age of 18.

Criminal Justice Act 1988 part XI
Makes it an offence to possess indecent images of children.

Criminal Justice and Courts Act 2015 section 33
Makes it an offence to share private sexual photographs or films with the intent to cause distress.

Sexual Offences Act 2003
Lists sexual offences and their definitions. If an image being shared is of a sexual act, police must find out whether a sexual offence has been committed and act accordingly.

Advice to children

LOSING CONTROL
Once you send a message you can't control what happens to it. Don't let someone guilt or pressure you into sending it.

IWF
If an indecent or nude pic of you is posted online, you can contact the website directly or make a report online to try and get it removed.

If you've sent a nude pic, have an honest conversation with the person you sent it to. Ask them to delete it.

READY, SET, INTERNET
FAMILY CONTRACT

The parents in our family will always:

- Keep the computer in a common area of the house such as the family room or kitchen.
- Use filters and other parental control software to protect our children.
- Monitor the amount of time our children spend on the Internet.
- Monitor conversations our children have on the Internet and get to know their friends.
- Take the time to train and encourage our children to use the Internet wisely.
- Maintain access to our children's profiles on social networking sites by requiring them to "friend" us.
- Share an email account with our children until they are old enough to be treated with their own.
- Know our children's email addresses and passwords.

The kids in our family will never:

- Share personal information such as their name, address, phone number, school, team, age, etc. with anyone online.
- Engage in any form of cyberbullying; we will treat others online as we would like to be treated.
- Send, forward, or respond to mean or threatening messages.
- Meet anyone in person that we met online without our parents' permission.
- Buy anything online without our parents' permission.
- Download games, movies, music, or programs without our parents' permission.
- Give our passwords to anyone but our parents.
- Join social networks without our parents' permission.
- Post or send pictures or videos online without our parents' permission.

The kids in our family will always:

- Tell our parents if anyone says or does anything online that makes us uncomfortable or upsets us.
- Give our parents permission to see what we do on the Internet and give them the passwords to all our accounts.
- Keep our parents as "friends" on all social network sites of which we are members.
- Tell our parents if we see something on a website that makes us uncomfortable or is inappropriate.

UK Chief Medical Officers' advice for parents and carers on Children and Young People's screen and social media use

Technology can be a wonderful thing but too much time sitting down or using mobile devices can get in the way of important, healthy activities. Here are some tips for balancing screen use with healthy living.

Sleep matters Getting enough, good quality sleep is very important. Leave phones outside the bedroom when it is bedtime.	Sharing sensibly Talk about sharing photos and information online and how photos and words are sometimes manipulated. Parents and carers should never assume that children are happy for their photos to be shared. For everyone – when in doubt, don't upload!
Education matters Make sure you and your children are aware of, and abide by, their school's policy on screen time.	Keep moving! Everyone should take a break after a couple of hours sitting or lying down using a screen. It's good to get up and move about a bit. Take a walk outside.
Safety when out and about Advise children to put their screens away while crossing the road or doing an activity that needs their full attention.	Talking helps Talk with children about using screens and what they are watching. A change in behaviour can be a sign they are distressed – make sure they know they can always speak to you or another responsible adult if they feel uncomfortable with screen or social media use.
Family time together Screens that steal time are a good idea – you can enjoy face-to-face conversation, with adults giving their full attention to children.	Use helpful phone features Some devices and platforms have special features – by using these features to keep track of how much time you (and with their permission, your children) spend looking at screens or on social media.

Children's charity the NSPCC has accused YouTube of failing to tackle dangerous content on its youth channel.

YouTube Kids, dubbed as a safer, child-friendly version of the video-sharing site, has been criticised by parents for failing to remove cartoons that contain clips depicting suicide methods on its platform.
